WCLT Scholarships

In 2021 the Westborough Community Land Trust (WCLT) awarded two \$1,000 scholarships and two honorable mentions to graduating Westborough High School (WHS) seniors. Awards were made on the basis of essays submitted in WCLT's annual Earth Day Essay Contest.

"We had a wonderful group of essays this year. Forty percent of the essay writers were fond of the Bowman Conservation Area. Other areas enjoyed were Cedar Swamp, Lake Chauncy, Mill Pond, Libbey/Wile, Upper Jackstraw Brook, and the Charm Bracelet trails," said Annie Reid of the Scholarship Committee. "Families, scouting, and courses in photography and in the environment helped these young people develop connections to the natural environment."

Leila Ahmed won a scholarship for her essay describing



how she enjoyed nature in the Bowman Conservation Area while growing up, became interested in the human impact on the area, and planned a garden of pollinator-attracting native plants there. In college she plans to pursue a degree in

environmental science or environmental engineering.

Colleen McGrath received a scholarship for her essay



describing how, through photography, she grew from a teenager feeling confined by Westborough into someone who loves nature, especially in Westborough, strives to live more sustainably, and carries a trash bag along with a camera.

She plans to study education at Boston College and is leaning toward a career in secondary education.

Michael O'Keefe received an honorable mention for his essay describing how, through Boy Scouts, his childhood enjoyment of nature developed into a passion that led him to carry out numerous projects focused on the upkeep and improvement of Westborough's trails and conservation areas, and to understand that we are all responsible for the upkeep of our natural resources. He plans to study engineering in college.

Infanta Antony was recognized with an honorable mention for her essay describing how, through scouting, she came to love exploring nature, especially in the Bowman Conservation Area, and with other Girl Scouts made a video to help protect Bowman by informing people about its wildlife, water supply, and history. She plans to attend college in the fall and aims eventually to become certified as a physician's assistant.



Since the beginning of our scholarship program in 2006, WCLT has awarded 26 scholarships to graduating seniors in Westborough, as well as 26 honorable mentions. Stewardship Committee

The Stewardship Committee maintains and manages WCLT lands. We also develop and maintain trails on other town lands, encouraging public enjoyment of Westborough's open spaces while preserving habitat for our native plants and animals.

As is true every year, WCLT has benefited tremendously this year from the help of Boy Scout and Girl Scout volunteers. This year, our Eagle Projects included the removal of invasive plants at Gilmore Pond, as well as bridging projects on the Upper Jackstraw Trail, the Malley Trail, and the Tree Farm Trail at Bowman West. And with six more Eagle Projects currently in the works, we're poised for another strong year of scout-led trail improvements.

For the Stewardship Committee, our big project this year is the continued renovation of the Gilmore Pond trail loop, which is supported in part by a MassTrails grant. In mid 2020, we broke ground on this two-year project, and at the time of this writing, over 600 volunteer hours have been invested in it. A new stone-dust tread surface has been installed around 3/4 of the loop, and we constructed a 20 foot bridge across the pond's inlet and installed

approximately 110 feet of boardwalk. We owe a special thank you to the students and staff of Assabet Valley Regional Technical High School who contributed over 300 hours of labor to the boardwalk design and construction. This spring and summer, we will be installing an additional 100+ feet of boardwalk, a post-and-rope handrail, and some additional stone dust tread, which will make the entire trail wheelchair- and stroller-friendly, starting from the Quick Farm Road trailhead and looping around the pond. We are aiming to have a "grand re-opening" celebration in the fall, once the construction is completed.

We will need a lot of help this spring and summer building and installing the remaining boardwalk sections and railing posts. If you're at all handy with basic carpentry (or are just willing to lend a hand), please let us know at stewardship@westboroughlandtrust.org.

Education Committee

The Education Committee had a busy 2020-2021. In early October, a total of 50 people enjoyed two **Twilight to Moonlight walks**. In October and November, two walks highlighting sections of the new **Boroughs Loop Trail** drew 18 and 30 people, respectively. In January, Chris Sassetti led 30 participants in **exploring Bowman West** in winter. Nancy Wright did a great job organizing our **photography contest**, which drew 133 entries from over 70 people. Eight prizes were awarded, including both adults and youth. Garry Kessler's February virtual talk on the **Galapagos Islands** was viewed by 45 people. Click here to see Garry's talk.

Due to Covid-19, the March **live animal show** was again postponed. Instead, we launched a **Facebook wildflower hunt**, which will run through October. Five April/May **birding walks** were co-sponsored with the Forbush Bird Club. An April virtual program on the "**Legacy of Birding in Westborough**," co-sponsored with the Historical Society, can be viewed <u>here</u>.

Our **April Earth Day Litter Cleanup** was a huge success. Participation by groups resumed this year, and families and individuals signed up online and cleaned their areas over the course of a week. A record-breaking 350 volunteers filled well over 250 trash bags, and Westborough is much cleaner. Thank you Rachel Radin for the online signup. Read about the cleanup here.

We co-sponsored "Alien Invasion," a talk on invasive plants, in May. In addition, a May Family Nature Hike attracted 24 people of all ages. The June Annual Meeting featured nature photographer Peter Christoph on "Birds of the New England Swamp."

Land Preservation Committee

Over the past year the Land Preservation Committee (LPC) has continued to promote the preservation of existing open space parcels, and the acquisition and protection of new open space parcels in our community. The LPC continues to work with other WCLT committees, Town boards and committees, Sudbury Valley Trustees, and others on several potential land protection projects.

This year we have continued to work with private and public property owners to establish and maintain trail easements for the 28-mile continuous loop Charm Bracelet trail network and other trail networks throughout the Town. We have also worked with the Stewardship Committee on the construction of new trail projects, the maintenance of existing trails,

and in support of the protection of existing open space parcels.

At the 2020 Annual Town Meeting the residents of Westborough voted to purchase the 31-acre Zwicker Farm property on Belknap Street property. LPC worked closely with the owners of the property to help bring this beautiful piece of land to the Town for consideration. The Town's recent acquisition of the Zwicker Farm property has protected this property for open space and has helped create an important link in the Charm Bracelet trail (click here). The LPC continues to grow with Rob Connor

joining our group. Rob lives near the Despres property at 31-33 Eli Whitney Street acquired by the Town in the Fall of 2020, of which 61-acres are devoted to conservation and passive recreation purposes.

Our efforts to protect the open land in the 123-acre Orchard Swamp area (between Route 9 and the Haskell ballfields) are advancing through active negotiations with several landowners.

As always, we continue to seek involvement of other WCLT committees and members in our work and we are committed to working to further the goals of the Trust and to protect the natural resources of the Town for the enjoyment of all.
