WCLT preserves, protects, and promotes Westborough's open space

President's Letter



Forming alliances and building strong collaborations has always been a hallmark of the Westborough Community Land Trust (WCLT). This year, we're excited to announce the formation of the WCLT's Land Restoration Committee (LRC), chaired by Rupali Shinde and Julia Rissmiller.

What is the Land Restoration Committee? The LRC is dedicated to supporting the rehabilitation of lands stewarded by the trust that have been degraded or damaged over time. Restoration efforts may include reforestation, soil conservation, invasive species removal, and the reintroduction of native plants and wildlife. Each project is guided by science-based best practices, with the goal of restoring ecological balance and biodiversity.

Currently, the LRC is continuing work begun in 2023, when Rupali and Julia launched the Westborough Pollinator Garden. This initiative has actively engaged local students in both classroom and hands-on outdoor learning experiences. Through their efforts, students are leading the restoration of native pollinator populations by propagating and planting carefully selected native species. All work is conducted in close coordination with the Town's Conservation Commission and informed by expert guidance. We hope the LRC inspires new energy and interest in land restoration and complements the important work already being done by our Education, Stewardship, Land Preservation, and Membership committees. 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Members of Westborough Student Council helped Rupali Shinde, chair of the Land Restoration Committee, tackle invasive bittersweet and honeysuckle in the Bowman Conservation Area. This was a continuation of the project we started in the fall 2024. This area will be slowly restored using native MA plants. This work is supported by the Westborough conservation commission.



SCHOLARSHIPS

The Westborough Community Land Trust (WCLT) awarded two **\$1,000.00** scholarships and three honorable mentions to graduating Seniors in Westborough. These awards were made on the basis of student essays written for the WCLT's annual Earth Day Essay Contest.

Tyler Monaghan received the WCLT scholarship for his essay describing Sandra Pond and how it has inspired him and provided comfort to him. Tyler's love for the pond came through clearly, and the fact that Tyler shared that love with his sister and friends is especially meaningful. Tyler completed a research project on global freshwater sources and the wildlife they support. Tyler's passion for Sandra Pond and nature is evident in the essay and this passion will no doubt continue to grow throughout his life. Tyler is a Senior at Thayer Academy. Tyler plans to attend Wesleyan University in the Fall. He would like to graduate with a degree in Physics or Engineering and will be part of the Men's Varsity Soccer team.

Noah Nourse received the WCLT scholarship for his essay describing some of the history of Nourse Farm and the roles he played while helping his family at the farm. The essay explains a great deal about the importance of preserving farms, noting that "...the farm provides so much more to the community than just the produce grown. It is a place where people can enjoy nature and learn about history, all while helping to preserve the 15th oldest continuously running family business in the United States of America." Noah constructed a nature trail with nine signs on the farm property. The pride he shows in the farm came through clearly in the essay. Noah is a Senior at Westborough High School. He plans to attend Denison University in the fall and will be majoring in international business.





Brooke Felton received an honorable mention for her essay describing fishing experiences with her late grandfather at Sandra Pond. The time spent with her grandfather showed Brooke the importance and beauty of nature. Brooke is a Senior at Westborough High School and plans on studying Forestry in college.

Aryan Bhatia received an honorable mention for an essay describing Lake Chauncy and the importance of the choices we make regarding the environment. Advocating for composting, recycling and reducing our carbon footprint was an important component of the essay. Aryan is a Senior at Westborough High School and will be attending Worcester Polytechnic Institute in the Fall in the engineering program. Aryan will be playing football for WPI as well.

Juhie Jain received an honorable mention for an essay describing how Gilmore Pond became an important place to go and think. The essay combined nature with science and engineering. Quoting from the essay, "Nature isn't just beautiful. It's efficient. Smart. Resilient." Juhie is a Senior at Westborough High School and plans on completing an undergraduate degree in biomedical engineering with a minor in entrepreneurship at Tufts University

Earth Day Litter Cleanup

Education Committee had another full year of events.

In October, 20 people attended an informative tour of the recently conserved Zwicker property in search of flowers and insects of the meadows with Garry Kessler. An amazing 92 people turned out for Sam Plummer's gorgeous sunrise and full moonrise walk at Lake Chauncy in November.

Our Winter Walk in January at the Headwaters Conservation Area drew 27 people. A tour of Fales School's green features in February brought 70 attendees. And two live animal shows in March by Animal Adventures delighted 385 people!

April's Litter Cleanup was a success, due to 600 volunteers. This included teams from 30 clubs and businesses and 30 households. Thanks to Rachel Radin for the online signup, the Westborough DPW for supplying cleanup bags and picking up the full ones, and Mugford's Flower Shoppe for donating flowers to the volunteer families. Read about the cleanup here. In early May, 25 people attended a rainy nature hike and scavenger hunt for kids at Gilmore Pond as WCLT's contribution to Westborough Unplugs Week. Sam Plummer led a spring tree and plant walk in early June. Our June Annual Meeting presenter, Westborough's Animal Control Officer Melinda MacKendrick, presented stories from her career.

We ran a table at Sustainable Westborough's March Environmental Action Fair, reaching many people who previously had not known about WCLT.

In addition, this year we co-sponsored eight bird walks with the Forbush Bird Club.

Based on our annual essay competition, we gave two scholarships to high school seniors, as well as three honorable mentions.

Charm Bracelet 25th Anniversary Hike Sunday, October 5, 2025, 1:00-3:00 pm

Westborough's Charm Bracelet trail loop network was created by the Westborough Community Land Trust 25 years ago. It was introduced at WCLT's inaugural hike at the Bowman West property on October 9, 2000. We will re-create much of that walk, with commentary about the history of Bowman West, the early days of WCLT, and the work that has been done at that property and our other trails in the past 25 years. The "Father of the Charm Bracelet" Don Burn will be the walk leader. About 2.5 miles of walking on woodland trails. Free, open to the public, no reservation needed.

Location: Meet at Minuteman Park on Upton Road, Westborough.

The American Chestnut Story: An Orchard Tour Sunday, October 26, 2025. 1:00-3:00 pm

Did you know there is an American Chestnut tree breeding orchard in Westborough? American Chestnut trees once dominated North American forests. With their huge size and their ability to produce many bushels of tasty nuts per tree each year, they were a cornerstone of ecosystems and livelihoods. Chestnut blight, a fungal disease, killed most of these trees in the decades following its introduction from Asia in 1901, but exciting efforts are being made to bring this tree back to its former glory. Learn the fascinating story behind the work that is being done on this tour of the American Chestnut orchard and the surrounding property! Led by Bill Davis of the American Chestnut Foundation. Free, open to the public, no reservation needed. Less than 1 mile of walking on easy woodland trails with one moderate hill.

Location: Meet at the Mass Wildlife Field Headquarters, 1 Rabbit Hill Road (off North Drive) in Westborough. Park at the "P" near the lower left corner of the map linked below.

Tour Westborough's Newest Open Space

Sunday, November 16, 2025, 1:00-3:00 pm

Did you know that at Westborough's Spring 2024 Town Meeting we voted to protect the Ellis-Walker property off Bowman Street? Come tour Westborough's most recently protected open space with Mark Silverberg, Chair of Westborough's Open Space Preservation Committee. Familiarize yourself with the public trails there, and learn about what makes this property special and the process by which it has been protected. About 2 miles on uneven woodland terrain. The walk is free, open to the public, no reservation needed.

Location: Drop off any passengers at the garage between 89 and 93 Bowman Street, where the walk will begin. Then park at the Bowman Conservation area, 72 Bowman Street. We will run shuttles to bring drivers to the trailhead. Do not park along Bowman Street.
